He reaches the world with radio

WALPOLE — When 83-yearold George Forant was a youngster, radio was in its infancy and one of his biggest thrills was picking up Springfield, Mass., on his homemade crystal set.

He has been involved in amateur radio operation more than 65 years and today has an efficient, up-tothe minute radio station capable of reaching all over the world in the basement of his home.

His transmitting and receiving ranges have increased somewhat since the early days. Today he talks by Morse code with other radio hams in Russia, Japan, Malaya and several hundred other places around the globe from Germany to Guinea.

He has received hundreds of cards from other amateurs telling the time their transmission was heard, and giving the call sign and location of the receiving station.

"My first recollection of becoming involved was as a youngster walking to school with a friend during the World War I years," he said. "We each had one of the large, round, dry cell batteries . . . and by

touching wires together could make sparks. We thought it was a lot of fun."

Forant received his radio operator's license in 1920 at age 17, and in 1922 was vice president of the Greater Boston Spark Coil Club.

He has a newspaper clipping that year telling how he and Jack McCarthy were vacationing on Cape Cod when they were instrumental in helping a ship in trouble.

"Jack and I used to mount our radios in the 30-foot launches we each owned and go out aways and practice sending messages back and forth," Forant said. "One day Jack picked up a signal from a tanker in distress off the coast. I was unable to pick up the message at that distance so Jack relayed the message to me and I informed the Coast Guard.

"The Coast Guard sent a cutter and I went out to near where Jack was and we stood by as the cutter took the tanker in tow to New Bedford. We felt like heroes in a minor way," Forant laughed.

For 24 years Forant has been one of 5,000 amateur radio operators in the Military Affiliate Radio System (MARS), which forms a link between the military and the local communities.

"Its very satisfying volunteer work," Forant said, "Servicemen stationed around the country or overseas can go to the on-base MARS station and send a message to mom, their girlfriend, or whomever, and that message will be transmitted to one of us in the community.

"We in turn telephone, or mail, the message to the local address.

It is a fast, economical and popular method of contact," he said.

For many years Forant was a musician, playing in bands all around the Greater Boston area. He is retired from the Hewlett-Packard electronics firm and has plenty of time now to devote to his lifetime hobby — searching the airwaves for someone to chat with.
